


Normalized Clothing Initiative for San Quentin

Proposing an Evidence-Based Process for Donating Branded Clothing to Incarcerated People



Introduction

We propose an evidence-based approach to providing customized clothing for incarcerated people at San Quentin, aiming to enhance their self-esteem and participation in self-help programs.



Objectives

- Provide normalized clothing options for San Quentin's incarcerated residents participating in self-help groups.
- Ensure clothing is easily identifiable, secure, and aligns with prison requirements.

<u>Scope</u>

This initiative is designed to improve the efficacy of self-help programs while increasing the dignity, self-esteem, and engagement of incarcerated participants by offering clothing that allows for personal expression and reflects their program affiliation



Benefits of Implementation

- Improves Behavior and Compliance:

- Studies show that more personalized and appropriate clothing can reduce disciplinary issues and promote better behavior.

- Supports Rehabilitation and Reintegration:

- Wearing normalized clothing helps incarcerated people feel more connected to society, aiding in their rehabilitation and reintegration post-incarceration.

- Boosts Participation in Self-Help Programs:

- Customized clothing can increase engagement and commitment to self-help groups, contributing to personal development and growth.

Option 1: One Shirt for Everyone



Groups purchase a standard shirt on which to affix their Logo

One Style One Color for Everyone






All Options Must Solve



- **Security Concerns**: Incarcerated people must be easy to identify.
- **Resource Allocation**: Solution must not burden the administration and the policy must be the same for all groups ensuring fairness
- Regulatory Compliance: Proposal must adhere to existing rules.
- Implementation: Must have a clear implementation plan.
- Evaluation and Metrics: Measuring program success.

Addressing Security Concerns



Exclusivity: Blue branded clothing, such as items with self-help or program logos, should be exclusive to incarcerated people. They should not be sold or distributed to the public.


Approved Sources: Only items directly from established organizations should be accepted.

Posters and Memos: Inform everyone of guidelines

Clarity and Consistency: Establishing a clear clothing standard replaces the current lack of guidelines with specific, consistent requirements.

Easy to Track and Manage

Indicates item is for current group members only





Indicates item is not restricted to currently assigned group members



Insures items are for inmates only.

Tacking and Accountability

Items are easily managed by organizations and CDCR

Allows quick verification or recall if necessary

Effortless Adoption



- Volunteer Management: Beige Card holders handle the logistics, reducing workload on CDCR staff.
- **External Donations**: Clothing is provided by self-help groups, not requiring CDCR funding.
- Accountability and Tracking: Control tags and dedicated volunteers ensure a streamlined process, preventing administrative complications.

Clothing Donation Guidelines

Clear
Guidelines
for Selfhelp
Groups



- -Color: Must be blue (not darker than navy).
- -Control Tag: All items must have a control tag.
- -**Exclusivity**: Branded items are for incarcerated residents only and must not be given to volunteers or outside parties.
- -Quality: High-quality and durable. This reduces waste and administrative workload.
- -Security Compliance: Follow CDCR guidelines (e.g., no metal parts or offensive graphics). Items directly from established organizations.
- -Quantity: Donations should be limited to meet specific program needs. CDCR will not store excess materials.

Statement of Need Required



- All donations must be accompanied by a Statement of Need.
- The statement must justify the donation and explain how it furthers **CDCR's mission**.
- Each statement should detail how the donated items support rehabilitation, education, or reintegration efforts.
- -Evaluation: All statements will be reviewed and approved by the California Resource Team.

Regulatory Compliance

- No Change to Regulations: Work shirts and memorabilia are allowed under existing policy.
- **Not Personal Property**: The items once donated are property of the state but overseen by the program.
- **Control Tag**: Clarifies ownership and avoids changes to D.O.M. or the Personal Property Matrix.



Implementation

OverviewApplication: Self-help groups submit a donation proposal with a Statement of Need.


Review: California Resource Team reviews and, if approved, sends paperwork to CRM (60 days for processing).

Security Check: If approved, donations are evaluated by security for compliance.

Distribution: Program administrators log and distribute approved donations.

Monitoring: Administrators track usage and gather feedback for continuous improvement.





Positives

Enhanced Accountability & Reduced Misconduct

Easier identification deters negative behavior and ensures accountability

Promotes Respect and Professionalism

Encourages a respectful and professional atmosphere, improving interactions.

Reduces Aggression and Improves Behavior

Professional attire reduces aggression and fosters better behavior.














Positives

Incentive to Program and Support for Rehabilitation
